

the hotel he heads up on the outskirts of JAIPUR's old city, is a ravishing compendium of Rajput heritage and Anglo glamour. Its 14 suites bear the names of the guests who slept in them: Mountbatten, Kennedy, Prince of Wales. It's stuffed with important antiques and good paintings, and 48 individual wallpapers were custom-designed for the many halls, receptions and arcades of the palace – once home to the British resident political officer of

Rajputana, then to Sawai Man ("Jai") Singh II, Jaipur's very modern and last ruling maharajah. It's a maximalist's dream, underpinned by some of the finest service in the land — and an outrageously good thali to boot.

great books, all bowered in the cool green shade of mopane trees. The guiding, this being a Wilderness outfit, is superb, but even if you skip every drive, you'll likely still see elephants: they tend to amble straight through camp by the dozens en route to the riverbank to drink.

→ SINGAPORE's hotel scene has long suffered a dearth of cool. Enter The Warehouse Hotel (thewarehousehotel.com; from £157), which breathed contemporary life into an old godown on Robertson Quay in January. I wouldn't call it the city's cushiest digs, nor its most cutting-edge, but I was impressed by the clever little culture moments in the rooms – the tasty hawker-inspired snacks, the kiat throws from a local design firm – and by the gorgeous (also local) custom metalwork. And the industrial-slick lobby seems to be functioning in the way a cool hotel bar in a big city should, but here, often doesn't – ie, an organically occurring nexus of pre-nightlife for guests and locals alike.
